## Hello Friends,

It's still July but Independence Day is in the rear view mirror, along with Juneteenth and Pride. Nonetheless, we wanted to take the month to consider freedom — what freedom means now and how so many of us still aren't free from violence, from discrimination, from poor health or toxic surroundings or a lack of access. Fireworks and cookouts are a good time — and we must allow ourselves space to have a good time. But, there is so much work to do and so much to consider. Taj James, one of MSC's cofounders, shared <u>this message</u> on the Fourth of July: "Let us commit to the work of making this place a true one person, one vote democracy. Let us commit to stewardship of the majority, for the thriving of all beings."

One only needs to look at the Supreme Court and its continuing reign of terror to see how much needs to be done. James, who <u>called</u> it "an illegitimate [majority] installed by an illegitimate president," is one of

Democracy at Home, a youth-led project that aims to get young people more involved in lawmaking and

one of MSC's newest fiscally sponsored projects, shared via Instagram:

"Democracy at Home is disappointed with the Supreme Court's decision and fully supports any and all attempts at ensuring America's universities continue to be places of diversity. Affirmative action did not unequally give BIPOC [students] an advantage over others. Affirmative action ensured America's universities would reflect our diversity."

Movement Strategy Network partners People's Climate Innovation Center also took to Instagram:

"We've been following all the recent discourse around the Supreme Court's recent ruling on affirmative action and the potential disruption it may bring to diversity, equity, and inclusion efforts nationwide, and we have this to say: we are here to stay. We remain firmly committed to supporting community-driven solutions to climate change that advance racial justice, and we will continue to lead with a bold vision of Black liberation toward collective liberation and intentionality in our internal and external work."

We also consider freedom in terms of the **landback movement** with a recent <u>blog post</u> about our tour of Felix Cove and the Point Reyes National Seashore with <u>Alliance for Felix Cove</u> - a fiscally sponsored project led by the inspiring Theresa Harlan.

We consider freedom from **environmental injustice** in the Bayview-Hunters Point neighborhood of San Francisco — where a vibrant Black community suffers the toxic fallout of the neighboring naval shipyard. Breathe, a fiscally sponsored project, partnered with an activist-journalist to release a podcast on the crisis. It's called <u>Sandblasted at the Shipyard</u>, and we recently published <u>an illuminating Q&A</u> on the project.

Finally, we consider freedom from **police brutality** with Tansy Hall McNulty who leads <u>One Million Madly</u> <u>Motivated Moms (1M4)</u>, another fiscally sponsored project. July is <u>Minority Mental Health Month</u> and we invite you to <u>revisit a Q&A</u> we shared last year when 988 launched. Stay tuned for a new check-in with McNulty as this nationwide emergency hotline — for suicidal thoughts, emotional distress, and mental health or substance abuse emergencies — celebrates its first birthday.
